



Risk Management

- Outdoor organisations aim to practice scenarios, but often lack time, resources and expertise for effective learning and application.
- There are few mechanisms for cross-sector (outdoors, land management, research, govt) to support risk management and response for outdoor practitioners. Those that are emerging within the national disaster framework are challenging for small outdoor organizations to interact with.
- When an incident occurs, an individual organisation has limited access to support from experts across the sector and maybe isolated and resource depleted.

Finance & Insurance

- It is increasingly difficult to access adequate, affordable insurance to protect business continuity and assets to mitigate risks in the outdoors from bushfires, floods and extreme weather events.
- Access to government relief or grants differs by jurisdiction and is difficult to navigate. Red tape can be burdensome. Political influence can be expensive and outcomes inequitable.
- Few outdoor providers, small organisations or not for profits have built up sufficient reserves or access to additional emergency cashflows to see through periods of disasters.

Remediating Impact

- Workforce shortages, in particular at middle management level post COVID, have impacted organisational knowledge and expertise in this area.
- Training for hazardous driving, vehicle retrieval, tree evaluation and lopping, chain-sawing and moving water are expensive, but the need for these skills is increasing.



Top Priorities for NatCORR

Weather & Conditions

Prepare training materials, run PD programs on weather, fire, flood and changing environmental conditions for outdoor practitioners. Provide input into training frameworks for outdoor training and qualifications requirements.

75%

Work with BOM, land managers, disaster management and other agencies to improve ease of access and usefulness of local information on weather and conditions.

Risk & Incident Management

75% Develop scenario testing and review training services to support outdoor organisations with continuous improvement in their incident response practices.

Sponsor industry sector groups (e.g. OEA and OCA) to develop a risk management community of practice, promoting news, events and participation through networks.

Collate a panel of experts and risk management service providers to be available to support incidents and disasters in the outdoors.

Finance & Insurance

77% Track and identify issues and needs. Facilitate efforts to support access to adequate and affordable insurance for outdoor organisations.

Improve knowledge and training support available to assist outdoor organisations to develop resilient financial management, and provide information on potential financial support available in times of crisis.





Weather & Environmental Conditions



Survey Comments

"Australia's government body responsible for providing accurate weather, has been politicised and their predictions are now unreliable. I can't rely on the accuracy of the BOM weather any longer, and have to use multiple alternative weather sources."

CHALLENGES

"The experiences are getting more dangerous and our education lags behind."

"While in non-emergency periods whether information provided is sufficient, during fire / thunderstorms, when you need information to be timely and precise, the standard systems are insufficient."

"Training is too simplistic for field staff. Most programs rely on field staff for weather interpretation and decision making, with the coordinators in an office somewhere being detached from a go/no-go call. This abdicates responsibility from a company to an individual."

"Lack of mobile coverage in large areas of WA to be able to monitor."

Cancelling programs that is reactive and not an

appropriate mitigation as weather event does not occur."

"Flood warning and info systems need to be substantially improved.

Weather & Environmental Conditions



Survey Comments

"Timely updated and models with confirmed integrity."

"The information needs to be aligned to specific location (GPS) real time."

"There needs to be specific approaches to each potential risk e.g., flood, fire, weather all have different nuances."

"My experience is that there is not widespread uptake of AAAS in general and weather-related guidance as part of that. The AAAS itself is fantastic but more could be put toward educating and collaborating within industry to have adoption more widespread and consistent."

NEEDS

"Training staff to access and understand weather alerts."

"The level of detail required by outdoor education providers is higher than the simple BOM screen. We need something similar to weather forecast for mariners. It should be about 1/2 to 1 page in length, including synoptic chart information, wind strength, cold etc."

"Like the BOM puts out sheep graziers alerts, put out outdoor recreation alerts."

"Investigate alternative sources of information to BOM."

"Risk grading as to safety of individuals in the field and relationship to weather events."

Survey Comments

"Inter connectivity of response due to lack of standardisation. It's a messy, confusing and overwhelming process to deal with an emergency."

"Saturation of information, guidance and directions. Creates confusion, uncertainty and chaos in decision making as situations unfold."

CHALLENGES

"The problem isn't so much access to information, it is

"My experience suggests the agencies have a low level of understanding of our sector specific needs. We are diverse and warnings and advice requires a nuanced approach."

"Primary concern is always immediate safety implications of staff/groups in the field. Following this is quality of experience on the ground and ability to adapt program accordingly."

"Paperwork requirements are high, but translating to actual useful practices can be difficult."

"Not having the clear guidance to run programs in partnership with land managers to consider the hazards."

"When the system is down, do the staff have skills to manage dynamic risks?"

"Collaboration is difficult where operators are in direct competition. This needs to change."

NEEDS

"Training of outdoor professionals regarding risk management in TAFE and Uni courses. Further advanced risk courses applicable to field work for management to continue to advance knowledge and approach to risk management."

"Outdoors NSW has implemented effective incident support however the nature of incidents still typically result in isolating feelings."

"Scenario based training - is certainly a big impost and takes a lot of time to develop for a given organisation and it's specific situation. Could a template for developing this training be created and support offered to assist organisations wanting to run this type of training? And/or - more widely available and regular PD opportunities in this area for organisational leaders/managers."

"An informal network of people that are happy to receive a phone call and offer guidance and advice - facilitated by NatCORR might be useful."

Survey Comments

"UPLOADS - the sector really needs this!! Too many companies with no SOPs and exposing risk to the sector more broadly."

"Open reporting on incidents and near misses, application of internationally established good practice systems for the development of safety management systems for providing adventure activities."

"Closing the gap between our internal world of operations, approach to risk monitoring and mitigation measures and that adopted (research underpinned) by broader external agencies to the sector."

"Enabling stronger links to other professional agencies who have expertise and broader data system access in real-time models."

"A strike team of people trained and able to assist."

"Some form of expert advice working group for different activity areas - roping, bushwalking, water-based etc. That people could access when developing procedures and safe practices, could be very useful."

3 Impact & mitigation



Survey Comments

"Underestimation of the degree of damage to areas."

"Spread of weeds and disease for fauna."

"Remediation is costly and Govt support post disaster is a key challenge."

"Lack of people allowed to assist land managers to aid recovery. Training would assist greatly here."

"Plenty of skills in clubs but reluctance for them to be utilised."

"Adequate knowledge and familiarity with place is increasingly challenged as workforce capacity has become more challenging. Getting accurate and up to date data from land managers is challenging."

"Finding out what is open and not open after a disaster is problematic and can encourage some people to access areas before they are deemed safe - mainly due to ignorance."

"Environmental sustainability should be front and centre. The tension here is real

"It's so inconsistent, even in the one area depending on who has management responsibility."

"Agency lack of resources and low priority to re-open and enable access."

"It is not the role of outdoor providers to become land managers and expert ecologists. We don't need to know how to make these decisions, we need to know how to work with land managers. The need isn't for the industry to push into already stressed ecosystems. The need is for industry to be adaptive for working in new landscapes."

"Attrition is a huge issue not just in information provision but also in capacity to maintain these areas so they don't become more degraded or bigger issues going forward."

"Familiarity with local context and relationships are key to risk management success, however risk personnel are few and cover broad areas, so risk adverse risk management staff with no local knowledge can be at odds with local knowledge local operators."

"Staff overestimating abilities or taking unacceptable risks for the sake of a program's continuation."

3 Impact & mitigation



Survey Comments

"While often we 'adventure' in the outdoors," there are times when as a industry we need to 'provide service' to the outdoor environment."

"Explore scope for engagement with Indigenous land management experts."

"I'm hoping that the federal disaster agency leads the top down approach to creating a baseline for policy response."

"There is a lot of relevant training in these skills however these are not typically within outdoor practitioner training - connecting with other training and cross sector workforce is important"

NEEDS

"Communicate to outdoor education or training institutes which remediation skills new graduates/trainees should be developing in their formative years."

"It's unrealistic to expect a single institution to provide the amount of training at the pace required. Becoming a networked touchstone and trusted resource is incredibly important and far more achievable."

"Training and knowledge enhancement will always be an important focus, particularly as we manage a industry with a relatively high turn over of staff."

"Gaining industry access to external research and current practices in this aspect outside of the sector."

"This is the domain of the land managers. Good communication (which does not currently exist) is key to returning safely to use."

"The Nature Stewards program berthed by Outdoors Victoria could assist nationally with tailored upskilling."

"Having the capacity to inform stakeholders of how sites remediation has been carried out and also what other agency assessments maybe informed to make assessments of areas for re use. Particularly tree hazard, road classifications, comms zones."

"Consistency in return to use standards would allow public messaging to have a united front."

"Practice guidelines need to be in the AAAS format"

4 Economic & Social Resilience



Survey Comments

"Insurance is one of the biggest impacts of Climate Change now, and in the future. Cost and lack of access to it is likely to significantly impact on for-profit providers."

"In the view of underwriters our sector is too discrete and small scale. We are amalgamated with a range of other sub-sectors and hence the claims rate is perceived as high."

"Underwriters have limited informed understanding of our sector, our informed professional practices and standards we apply and operate to...insurance is our biggest future risk to access."

"Even just insurers that understand the outdoor sector, let alone the implications of climate change and natural disasters on the sector."

"Price will become out of reach in near future. Insurers pulling out if the industry."

"There is a lack of strategic thinking and future planning - this is a skill that needs to be taught."

"Business acumen of the industry is not good. Capacity building as commercial entities in planning and financial planning."

CHALLENGES

"Clubs have difficulties in cash flow as members reluctant to spend more."

"Insurance / cash flow is an issue. The insurance often comes too late."

"Heightened requirement to share documentation and systems with insurers .. very time consuming when this already occurs for accreditation."

"Navigating the insurers requirements for evidence."

"Need a compulsory scheme for Outdoor Education."

"Outdoor industry doesn't seem to have clout at political level to generate change and get real support."

4 Economic & Social Resilience



Survey Comments

NEEDS

"Insurance costs won't lower at any point in the future given the size and frequency of events. Best perhaps to build resources on how to build sustainably, manage land, and build resilience into processes as much as possible. Community capacity is increased by addressing the isolation felt post disaster. Again, communication forms the base."

"Improve the relationships between our sector and insurance entities to strengthen understanding liabilities and recognised measures to mitigate these."

"Opportunity for 'teaching' insurance providers about the outdoor/education sector and the huge amount of work being done in risk management."

"These are important issues but not sure NatCORR should be leading - they can provide the background data to support peak bodies prosecute the arguments."

"Industry association should be the focus of insurance. We need to avoid duplication of effort and erosion of limited resources." "Access to grants is okay - people need to learn how to respond to them. We could use consolidated help across the sector to respond."

"Financial literacy training as part of business development."

"Mentorship programs, networking, asset sharing, formal training - important that the industry creates security from within."

"Resilience is the way to move forward, we cannot reverse the rate of events. We can hope to build a network of providers and information that gives users a place to turn and a means to move forward."

"This collaboration is critical. We all speak different languages post emergency and there are so many voices in a space that you lose any hope of meaningful communication.

Standardisation of the foundation is the key in my mind."


Work In Progress
